



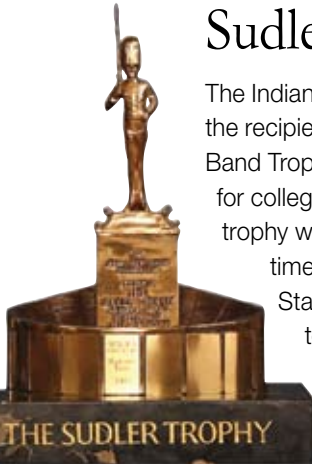
Orion Quartet members, from left to right, Timothy Eddy, Todd Phillips, Steven Tenenbom and Daniel Phillips

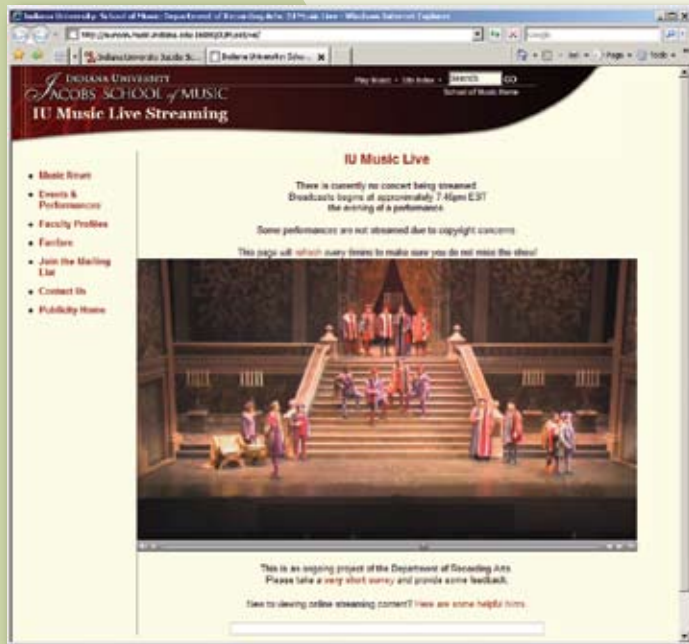
Sudler Trophy

The traveling trophy was presented at an awards ceremony during half-time of IU's Homecoming football game against Penn State on October 20, 2007, followed by a celebratory banquet in Alumni Hall later that evening. 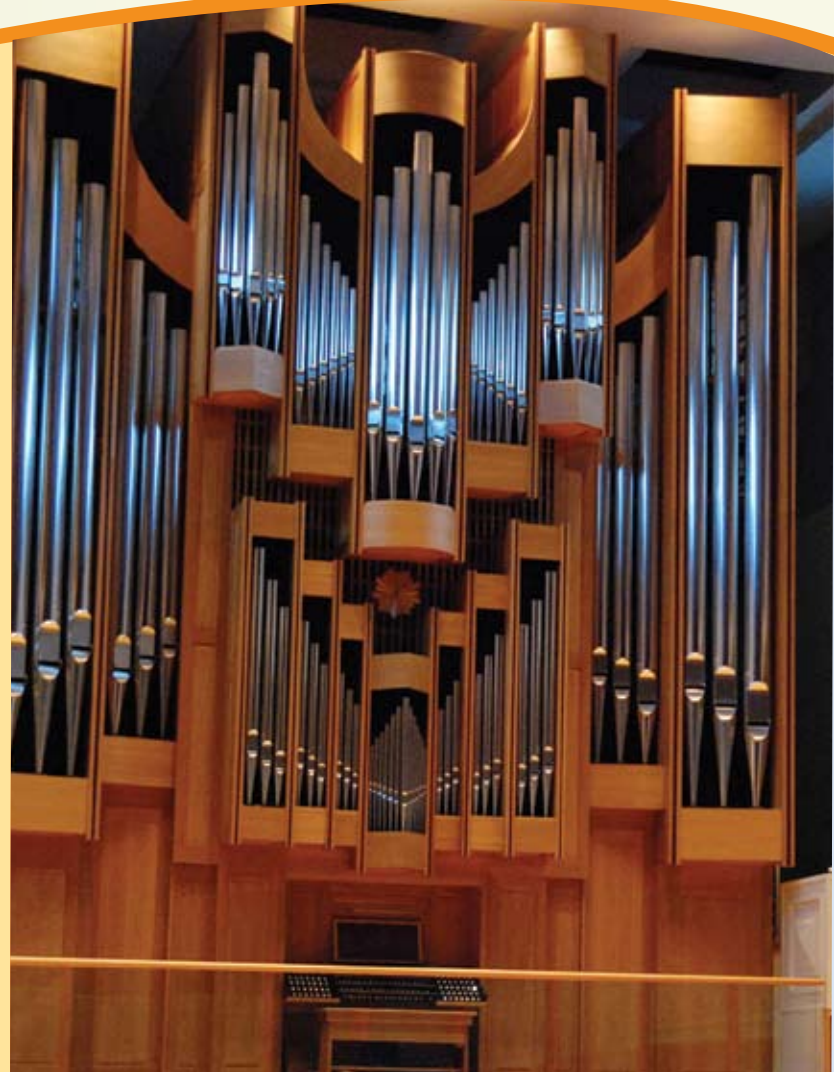


Podcasts and Streaming

Thanks to the ground-breaking work of the Department of Recording Arts in collaboration with Music Information Technology Services, the Jacobs School continued its growing role as a leader in the emerging digital frontier with a November 2006 announcement of regular audio and video podcasts. More recently, the school tested a live streaming service that will enable alumni and friends from around the world to enjoy selected IU Opera & Ballet Theater, orchestral, chamber, and other events on a regular basis. 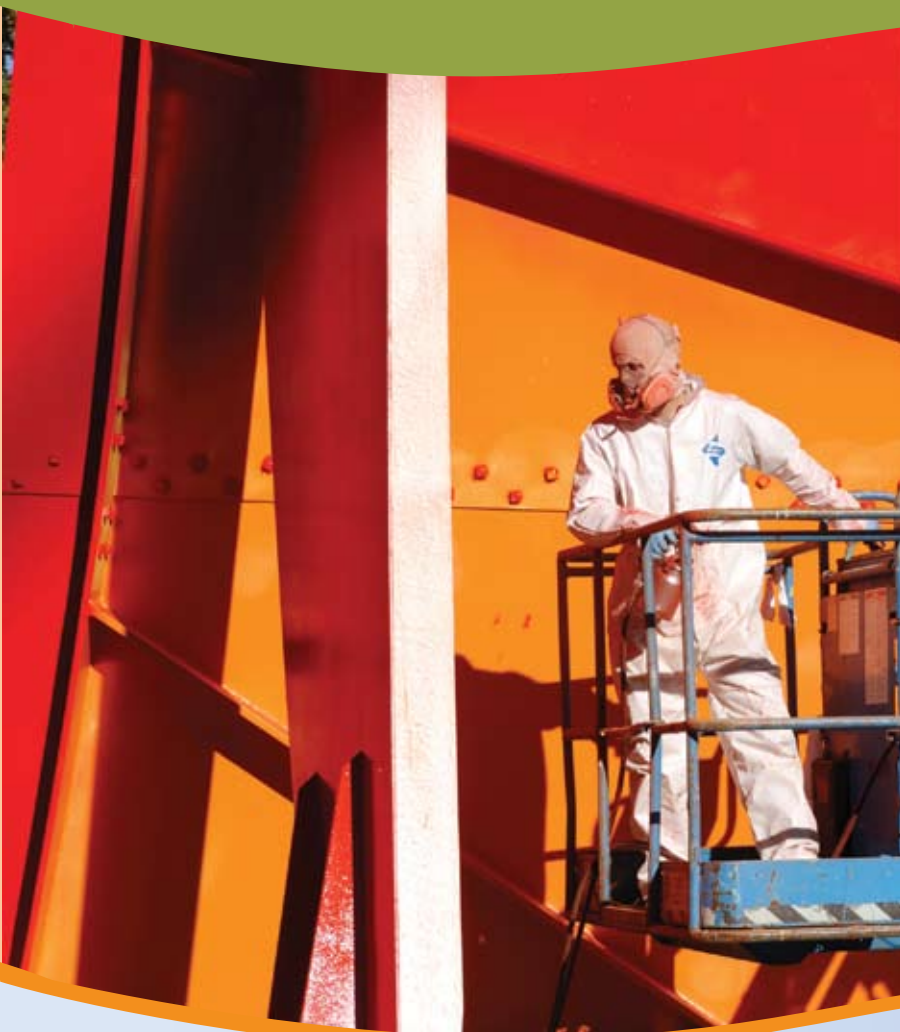
Maidee H. and Jackson A. Seward Organ Announcement

The Jacobs School of Music announced May 4 that the Gloucester, MA, organ company C. B. Fisk, Inc., has been contracted to rebuild the Maidee H. and Jackson A. Seward Organ in Auer Hall. With almost 4,000 pipes, the instrument will be transformed into a Fisk Op. 135 and is expected to debut in the fall of 2010, the 100th anniversary of the formation of a department of music at Indiana University. "We have found a partner in C. B. Fisk," stated Jacobs School Dean Gwyn Richards, "an entity of the highest regard with an ability to match our aspirations by building an instrument that will be cherished for generations to come." John Seward, son of benefactors Maidee H. and the late Jackson A. Seward, also was happy to hear of the contract with C. B. Fisk. "We're delighted that a solution has been found and to know that generations of Jacobs School faculty, students, and guest artists, with their audiences, will benefit from this world-class instrument." Peau Rouge Indiana Restoration

The restoration of Alexander Calder's magnificent sculpture Peau Rouge Indiana was completed towards the end of November following three months of careful work by a group of conservators. Prior to the work, IU consulted with the Calder Foundation and others to determine how best to address environmental and artistic interests involved in the project. 2007 USA International Harp Competition

On July 14, 2007, USA International Harp Competition finalists Coline-Marie Orliac of France, Hanako Hirano of Japan, and Maria Krushevskaya of Russia performed with the IU Summer Music Festival Orchestra, under the direction of David Efron in the Musical Arts Center. Following introductory remarks by IU President Michael McRobbie, Dean Gwyn Richards, and competition founder and artistic director Susann McDonald, prizes valued at more than \$100,000 were awarded. The **IU Jacobs School of Music** presented another summer rich with showcase events in 2007, including Grammy Award-winning vocal ensemble Chanticleer, concerts by the Beaux Arts Trio, Kalichstein-Laredo-Robinson Trio, American Chamber Players, Penderecki and Biava Quartets, Weiss-Kaplan-Newman Trio, and pianist Arnaldo Cohen, as well as the return of the Festival Jazz Orchestra, directed by David Baker.
